

Scripture The Faithful Version

Cain and Abel

Genesis 4:1-16

Then Adam knew Eve his wife, and she conceived and bore Cain, and said, "I have gotten a man from the LORD." And she bore again, his brother Abel. And Abel was a keeper of sheep, but Cain was a tiller of the ground. It came to pass that Cain brought to the LORD an offering of the fruit of the ground. And Abel also brought of the firstlings of his flock and of the fat of it. And the LORD had regard unto Abel and his offering, but He did not have regard unto Cain and his offering. And Cain was extremely angry and his countenance fell.

And the LORD said to Cain, "Why are you so angry? And why has your countenance fallen? If you do well, shall you not be accepted? But if you do not do well, sin lies at the door. Its desire is for you, but you must rule over it!"

And Cain talked with his brother Abel. And it came to pass that when they were in the field, Cain rose up against his brother Abel and killed him.

And the LORD said unto Cain, "Where is your brother Abel?" And he said, "I do not know. Am I my brother's keeper?" And He said, "What have you done? The voice of your brother's blood cries to Me from the ground. And now you are cursed from the earth, which opened its mouth to receive your brother's blood from your hand. When you till the ground, it shall no longer yield its strength to you, and you shall be a wanderer and a fugitive upon the earth."

And Cain said to the LORD, "My punishment is greater than I can bear. Behold, You have driven me out from the face of the earth today, and I shall be hidden from Your face. And I shall be a fugitive and a wanderer in the earth, and it shall be that anyone who finds me shall kill me."

And the LORD said to him, "Therefore whoever kills Cain, vengeance shall be taken on him sevenfold." And the LORD set a mark upon Cain so that anyone who found him should not kill him.

And Cain went out from the presence of the LORD and lived in the land of Nod, to the east of Eden.

Bible Story

Cain and Abel

Not long after leaving the Garden of Eden, Adam and Eve had a son they named Cain. Eve was very happy and said, "with God's help I have made a man." Later, Eve gave birth to another son called Abel.

Cain became a farmer and planted many crops - fruits, vegetables, grain and root crops. He was proud of the



things he grew. The land produced very good crops every time. Abel became a shepherd. He had lots of sheep, big ones and little ones. He loved to hear them bleating and to watch them running around the field in the sunshine. Abel got a lot of milk from them, and he also used their wool to make clothes.

From the time the two boys were children, their Mum and Dad taught them to worship God. One way of doing this was to offer an animal as a gift to God. Each of the brothers had to make this offering for himself. They could not make the offering for each other.

One year, when the crops were ready to harvest, Cain and Abel brought their gifts to God. Cain brought some beautiful food he had grown, and Abel brought the best sheep from his flocks. The Lord accepted Abel's gift or offering, but He did not accept Cain's offering.

God accepted Abel's offering because he followed what God said. He gave him a gift of an animal. But God did not accept Cain's offering because he did not follow God's rule. Cain gave him a gift of fruits, vegetables and other such things, but this is not what God had asked for.

Cain became very upset about this. He thought it was just not fair. It was really hard work being a farmer, and he had brought God lovely fruit and vegetables from his garden. Abel watched his flock and protected the sheep, but Cain thought it wasn't hard work like farming was. Cain kept thinking about how unfair it was that God had rejected him, and he became very angry, then angrier still.

Then the Lord called out, "Cain, Cain, what's wrong? Why are you so angry? Why are you so upset?"

God told Cain that if he would do what was right, God would then accept him. Getting angry was not the right thing to do.





The Lord then warned him, "You have to control your thoughts and feelings, or you will keep getting more upset. Then when you get yourself really upset, that is when you can do some very bad things, cause much unhappiness, and wreck your own life too."

But Cain didn't listen to God. He became so angry that he planned to kill his brother. One day, he went to Abel and said, "Let's take a walk to the field. I want to show you something." But he tricked him.

Abel trusted his older brother, so he went with him. When they were all alone in the field, Cain suddenly attacked Abel and killed him. The strike was swift and violent, and Abel was taken by surprise.

God knew what Cain had done but later that day He asked him, "Cain, where is your brother, Abel?"

Cain wasn't happy about the question, and he now felt confused and upset because he knew that he had done something terrible. He had killed his brother. God then upset him even more because He was still asking for Abel, who Cain thought was God's favorite.

Cain did not want anyone to know what he had done to his brother. He was also still angry, so he lied and said disrespectfully to God, "I don't know. Am I his babysitter?"

Then the Lord got very angry and said, "What have you done? I know you killed your brother!"

He told him, "I warned you of the danger of holding onto anger and resentment and now you have killed your brother." Cain hung his head.

"Abel cannot enjoy his family or this land anymore, and neither will you be able to. Because you did this terrible thing, I will put you in a land far away from everyone else, a land that is far away from this good land," God said.

God then punished Cain. He would no longer have a home in his parents' land. He would not be able to settle down anywhere and have a permanent home. Cain would become a wanderer. He would not even be able to produce the good crops he was so proud of. God told him, "the ground will no longer help your plants to grow."



Cain started to cry. "You are punishing me too much! You are kicking me out of this land, and I will be all by myself, wandering from place to place. Anyone I meet could kill me as well!"

So, God gave Cain protection from being killed. He told Cain, "No, I will make it clear that if anyone harms you, they will be punished even worse."

The Lord put a special mark on Cain, so that people would not kill him. So, just as his parents, Adam and Eve, had been driven from the Garden of Eden for disobeying God, Cain was driven from his home and land and from God. From that time, Cain was taken far away to live in the land of Nod, which means the land of wandering.




Adam and Eve with Cain and Abel


